## *Police News Update, September - December, 2005*

About 1030am on 16th November a woman member of our Watch had her handbag taken from her as she walked along **Muir Wood Road**. The culprit is described as male, white, 5'5" tall wearing a beige baseball cap and beige and blue jumper. She did have a personal alarm with her but it was in her stolen handbag. It is recommended that the alarm be hand held with the cord around the wrist. Thankfully the lady, although badly shaken at the time, seems to have recovered. There have been a number of similar incidents throughout the City and these are being investigated by the divisional CID.

#### Bogus Callers:

During the afternoon of 4th October, two males, claiming to be from the Water Board, called on an elderly man in Stewart Avenue. They stole a small amount of cash. One was described as white, 5'6", 16 years wearing a light red and brown anorak. The second looked slightly younger and wore a light anorak. This emphasises the need for us to check the credentials of anyone claiming to be from one of the utility companies, particularly if there are two together, one of whom can keep us engaged while the other robs us. If there is any doubt whatsoever, keep them on the outside of your locked door while you check with their company or with the Police.

#### Remote Reporting Scheme:

Many people are reluctant to report crimes and other incidents direct to the Police. Remote reporting allows the reporting of such matters to a third party agency which forwards the report to the Police. The agency may also offer support and advice to the individual concerned. Lothian and Borders Police have been operating this system since 2000 with such success that the number of remote reporting sites in Edinburgh has risen to 18. #### Joining Forces To Fight Fire:

Injury and damage caused by fire concern all the emergency services. Since April, 2004, Lothian and Borders Fire Rescue Service have been running a fire prevention initiative funded by the Scottish Executive and the Council. It allows for any house in the area to have a home safety check and, if necessary, have a battery operated smoke alarm installed **free of charge**. These checks are carried out by local fire fighters and can be arranged by either:

- contacting any one of the 36 local fire stations in this area, or
- calling the free phone number 0800 169 0320

To date, 11,500 smoke alarms have been installed. The idea has proved a great success and service quality checks carried out by the Fire Service have found that 95% of people who received a home visit felt safer afterwards.

The Police have organised joint initiatives with the Fire Service. These have seen Fire Fighters and local Police calling at houses together to offer advice on all aspects of fire safety and home security. These visits have also been very well received.

## *Summary of Minutes of Committee Meeting on 5th December, 2005.*

Present: David Eatock (Chair), 11 Members, 3 Apologies.

In Attendance: Dave Oxenham, Duncan Law and Bill Manson.

Welcome: David welcomed everyone, especially the new members from the AGM and the representatives from the “Mid Currie” Watches.

Thomson/Easter Currie “Merger”: David gave an update on the proposal agreed at the AGM and on correspondence with (their description) the “Mid Currie” Watches. A meeting with Sergeant MacIver had reached agreement despite Police reservations regarding the potential size of the combined Watches.

Dave and Duncan gave more information about their Watches. They would advise their members that subscriptions are due but would not collect them for the moment as this would mean a larger distribution of funds if the Watches had to be wound up.

Gordon felt we should try to kick-start these Watches as it would be detrimental to see them go down. It was agreed to call a meeting of the Mid Currie Watches’ distributors to try to establish a Committee with the help of Muirwood. Gordon would try to organise this as a cheese and wine evening funded by Muirwood.

Treasurer’s Report: Bank balance = £1160.57. Wheelie bin stickers and personal attack alarms are still available from the Treasurer.

Assault in Muir Wood Road: As detailed in Police News, one of our members, Mrs Jean MacKay, was mugged in daylight in Muir Wood Road. Gordon was thanked for the concern shown on our behalf to Mrs MacKay.

Travelling People: David, after a call from Duncan Law, had spoken to the Police about travelling people camped on the Kinleith Mill site. The Police were monitoring the site on a daily basis. It was noted that the travellers have now moved on.

Jet Petrol Station: The planning application (reported elsewhere) has been withdrawn as it was invalid. Provost Haugh’s representatives (who were most affected) would advise the Committee of any further developments.

Muir Wood Road: Cars are being parked in a dangerous position at the entrance to Muir Wood Road from Lanark Road. The Chairman would ask the Council to mark both sides of the hill with double yellow lines.

Condition of Roads and Pavements: Last May, David wrote to the Council about the condition of our roads and pavements but was told there are no monies available for our area. A letter from Alex Kane to our MP, Alistair Darling, elicited a similar reply. It was agreed to invite the roads Network Manager to come to Currie to see, for himself, the problems. Councillor Paisley should also be involved.

### *Garden Security*

Your garden, as well as your house, has valued possessions that thieves would love to steal: plants, trees, hanging baskets, containers, tools, lawnmowers, etc. It also has equipment which could help them break into your house.

A few simple, inexpensive precautions can make your garden and your home more secure. Look at the perimeter - planting a prickly plant will not only screen your valuables but will also act as a deterrent, but don't let the plant grow too high as that may then screen the thief from the street or your neighbours. If you have a fence, plant a thorny climbing plant against it.

In the garden, keep tools out of sight when you are not using them. A spade, for example, can be used to force a window and door locks, and ladders - keep them under lock and key - need we say any more. If you have a garden shed make sure its door and window have substantial locks.

The back of your house is more vulnerable than the front and an added deterrent, if there is a side passage, would be the fitting of a lockable security gate. Lastly the installation of security lighting covering the back garden and sides of the house is highly desirable.

Planting suggestions to provide natural protection around your property are: Common Holly, Pyracantha Firethorn, Berberis, Mahonia.

## *Dealings with City of Edinburgh Council*

### **Jet Petrol Station**

As you will have read in the C & B News, there is a proposal before the Council to demolish the existing structures at the Jet Petrol Station and to construct a new forecourt (including pump islands and canopy), new forecourt shop/sales building, new parking provision, new car wash, new ATM and new underground storage tanks.

On your behalf your Committee expressed their concern to the Council and have been advised that we will be kept informed of future developments and consulted where relevant. We have also been advised of the following:

There will be 3 fuel deliveries a week and one composite delivery daily. Ideally the deliveries will be at or before 8 am.

The petrol station will be open from 7 am to 11 pm.

There will be no floodlighting on the site.

There will be some cooking of food on the premises, but not from raw. The products will be baked from frozen.

We have still to be advised of the acoustic implications of the car wash, jet wash, vacuum and air/water plant.

### **State of the Roads**

Concern has again been expressed to the Council regarding the state of the roads within the estate and a meeting has been arranged between a representative of the Council and representatives of Neighbourhood Watch to provide the Council with first hand information about the state of our roads and pavements which, in some parts of the Watch area have not been correctly repaired for nearly 40 years. It has also been suggested to the Council that they may wish to consider painting yellow lines around the brow of the hill from Lanark Road in to the estate at Muir Wood Road.

Members will also be aware of the deteriorating condition of the road between the two bus stops in Juniper Green. The Council are aware that the road between Baberton Avenue and the start of Lanark Road West is nearing the end of its useful life and will be looking at the situation along with many other contenders for funds for repair.

Finally, the Council are about to embark on an Accident Investigation and Prevention Scheme for the section of Riccarton Mains Road North of the railway bridge where most of the accidents have happened over the years. This

will include anti-skid surfacing, warning signs and a vehicle speed activated “Slow Down” sign. It is also hoped that the Council will promote a Traffic Regulation Order to reduce the speed limit from 60 mph to 40 mph in Riccarton Mains Road between the entrance to Currie and Heriot Watt University. We would strongly urge you all to support this order when the time comes.

### ***Points to Ponder***

- House breakers do not want to be observed.
- At the front of a house keep fences and hedges low.
- Install security lighting which comes on as someone approaches.
- Arrange for the tell-tale signs of absence to be eliminated e.g. newspapers in the letterbox, milk bottles etc.
- Ranch style fences make good ladders: consider fence panels in their place.
- Always keep the side gate bolted and locked.
- Thick and thorny bushes or trees form a natural barrier and are very effective.
- Consider treating the drain pipes with anti-climb paint.
- A strong trellis makes a good ladder.
- Always ensure that your ladders are securely locked away and not left unattended.
- Garages contain many desirable items, particularly tools, freezers etc, so always ensure that the doors are locked when not in use.
- Keep a photographic record of valuable items in a secure place.
- Keep a record of the serial numbers of such items as Video, T V, Hi-Fi, camera's etc.
- Mark your valuable items with an ultra-violet sensitive pen using your post code followed by the number of your house.
- If you have louvred windows, make the removal of the glass louvres difficult by using a resin adhesive such as Araldite to keep the glass in place.
- Burglars try to avoid breaking glass - it is difficult to climb in or escape through. They are looking for a nice clean entry and exit: don't leave your house keys lying around.
- It is recommended that internal doors should not be locked. If a burglar gains entry he will cause additional damage.
- One of the main objects of burglary these days is, because of keyless cars, to acquire the card for entry into your vehicle.

## ***Car Theft***

The theft of car keys by “slip in” to houses followed by the theft of the car remains a “*modus operandi*” that concerns me, yet it could so easily be prevented.

The car thief relies on the owner abandoning car keys very close to the entry point to the house and leaving the door insecure. By simply getting into the habit of keeping your car keys in a more secure location you will thwart the thief. In many cases you will probably not even know he has “looked” for your key. Of course, you should also get into the habit of securing the house door even when you are at home!

You do live in a safe, low crime area but thieves can try to use this to their advantage and look for complacency!

This is not something I have ever done but, since reading the article from Inspector Grant, I have been paying much more attention to what other people do and have been surprised by the number who leave their car keys just inside the front door and do not lock the door.
