HOUSEBREAKINGS

Over recent weeks there have been a number of thefts by house breaking at the homes of the predominantly Chinese community. Most of these crimes occurred from late afternoon onwards, whilst the occupiers were out. In several of the crimes; suspicious persons have been seen near to the homes that have been broken into. The perpetrators of these crimes appear to be a small criminal group of males and females.

Please, if you see anyone acting suspiciously near to these homes; or anywhere else; as a priority phone the police giving the best description that you can of the persons or any vehicles involved.

Some simple advice

By taking a few simple steps we can make it more difficult for the thief and reduce the chances of becoming a victim of crime. Most often the housebreaker will attack the most vulnerable point of entry to a house.

So before leaving your home, even for a short time

- Lock all doors and windows and use all the locks fitted to doors and windows
- If you an alarm system use it – every time you leave the house
- During the hours of darkness consider using timer switches for lights etc.

You should ensure that your home is secure at all times, even when you are at home.

THEFT FROM MOTOR VEHICLE.



On the 30th an insecure vehicle was entered in Stewart Gardens and a quantity of fizzy drinks stolen.

THEFT OLP

Between the 3rd and the 14th, 2 caravans were entered and numerous items of property stolen.

Between the 3rd and the 4th, 3 pedal cycles were stolen from a premises in Belmont Road. One is described as: **CLAUDE BUTLER MAKE, RED, COLOUR IS FADED AND BIKE LOOKS PINK, SHIMANO GEARS, ONE OF WHICH IS SILVER AND ONE RED, BLACK GEL SEAT.**

CRIMES AGAINST THE PERSON

On the 27th a male was assaulted by a group of youths while out for a jog.

THEFT – OTHERS

On the 15th a handbag and contents were stolen from a premises in Dalmahoy.

On the 15th a car parked near Heriot Watt had its number plate stolen.



HOUSEBREAKINGS

On the 21st a premises in Hermiston were entered and searched. Nothing was stolen.

Between the 17th and the 20th a garden shed in Nether Currie Crescent was entered and a Marin make bicycle stolen.

On the 3rd there was an attempt to enter a garage premises in Lanark Road West. 2 males aged 13 – 15 were seen. Descriptions were sparse.

SOLVED CRIMES

On the 28th a 15 year old male was charged with shoplifting, vandalism and a breach of the peace.



On the 21st a 17 year old male was charged with threats, breach of the peace and carrying a 12" bladed knife.

On the 12th a 30 year old male was charged with numerous motoring offences and breach of the peace.

On the 11th a 20 year old male was charged with driving offences following an accident.

On the 7th a 16 year old male was arrested and charged with a breach of the peace and serious assault in Forthview Crescent.

CITIZENS ARREST AND THE DETENTION OF OFFENDERS BY THE PUBLIC

Following the disruption and problems in and around some area in Currie, I have been asked to confirm the position with what was originally called a 'CITIZENS ARREST' or detaining a suspect until the police arrive. Here is the wording from our Police Information Net for Scotland.

'A private citizen has certain common law powers of arrest but they must be exercised with care as wrongful arrest can result in a claim for damages. The crime must be a serious one and not merely a breach of the peace, and he must be certain that an offence has been committed by, for example, witnessing it or being the victim'

'Reasonable force may be used if the arrested person resists and he must be handed over to the police as soon as possible. '

The main points are:

The crime must be of a serious nature, car crime, assault, theft etc.

The detaining person must be either a first hand witness or the complainer.

Only reasonable force can be used for the detention.

The suspect must be handed over to the police as soon as possible.

AND FINALLY

Film runs out of road as speed cameras go digital

It was the last refuge of speeding drivers - as the dreaded flash goes off, the fleeting possibility the safety camera had run out of film.

But now Scotland's roads will have their first digital speed cameras which never require a film change and are permanently "live" - beaming images of offending drivers to processing centres 24 hours a day.

The cameras will enable images of vehicles to be beamed back remotely. This eliminates the potential safety hazard to camera staff having to change the film weekly.

It could also mean drivers receiving speeding tickets the day after they are caught, rather than the current average of nine to ten days.

The first camera is expected to be installed at a new site on the A71 near Mid Calder by next month. It will also be West Lothian's first fixed speed camera. A second camera will be deployed at an existing red-light camera site at the junction of Queensferry Road and Drum Brae in Edinburgh.
