TOPICS

There is an emerging problem with thefts of metals across the City of Edinburgh. Due to the increased demand for base metals throughout the world, scrap value of steel, lead, aluminium and copper has greatly increased recently making the theft and sale of these items a viable black market business opportunity. As the scrap value of metals continues to rise it is likely they will become an even more attractive commodity for criminals, and the numbers of thefts of this kind will rise.

Noticeable of late have been the theft of road signs, railings, scaffolding and many other every day items that we take for granted that can be found in your street.

A disturbing trend is the theft of manhole covers, a large number of which were stolen recently from the Portobello area. The theft of these items presents a danger for children, pedestrians and other road users. As well as the potential damage and injury that could be caused as a result of these thefts, manhole covers cost in the region of £100 each to replace and costs could rise to £1000 depending on the damage caused to the site during the commission of the theft.

Organised groups of criminals who specialise in the theft of drain covers using specialist equipment are believed to be operating throughout the UK. We would urge all members of the public to report any suspicious activity they see to the police on 0131 311 3131 or by dialling 999 in any case where urgent Police assistance is required. Here is the May newsletter covering activity from the 1st to the 30th April 2008.

HOUSEBREAKINGS

Between the 16th and the 19th, there was an attempt to enter a leisure facility in Lanark Road West. The MO on this occasion was to attempt entry via a fire door.



Between the 18th and the 20th a garage premises in Juniper Gardens was entered and 2 mountain bikes stolen. They are described as:

- 1. KONA MAKE, KALDERA MODEL, GOLD IN COLOUR, 27 GEARS, BLACK GRIPS, GREY FORKS, WITH A CHILD SEAT BRACKET THEREON ATTACHED AT THE REAR.**
- 2. SPECIALIZED MAKE, STUNT JUMPER MODEL, BLACK IN COLOUR, 24 GEARS, BLACK SADDLE RIPPED AND CLIPLESS PEDALS.**

Between the 31st and the 3rd there was an attempt to enter a premises in Dolphin Gardens East. The MO was to insert a chisel or similar into the door surround. The lock held, no entry was gained.

In the early hours of the 1st a premises in Belmont Road was entered. Entry was gained to the conservatory area, however the culprits were unable to gain entry to the main house.

Again in the early hours of the 1st entry was gained to a premises in the Kirkgate. Entry was gained after a lower window was damaged.

EDINBURGH VIOLENCE REDUCTION PROGRAMME 2008-2013

First five year strategy to reduce violence in Edinburgh

The first five year strategy to reduce violence in Edinburgh will be launched today (6th May) by the Edinburgh Community Safety Partnership.

The *Edinburgh Violence Reduction Programme* (EVRP) 2008-2013 brings together a range of partners and agencies that all have a commitment to reducing violence in Edinburgh.

Over the next five years the EVRP will co-ordinate multi-agency strategies, share expertise and resources and drive activity through a series of initiatives.

Three work streams have been identified to deliver the greatest impact upon violence reduction in the Capital:

- Violence Against Women
- Alcohol and the Night-time Economy
- Other Street Violence

The overall aim of the EVRP is to create a safer environment in Edinburgh where violence is deemed unacceptable. Superintendent Ramzan Mohayuddin of Lothian and Borders Police, said:

'Whilst Edinburgh is fortunate enough to have lower levels of violence than many comparable cities, there is no room for complacency. The profound impact that violence has on victims, perpetrators, witnesses and families is obvious.

'The EVRP introduces a co-ordinated multi-agency approach to violence reduction in Edinburgh. I believe that by working together in this way we will make Scotland's Capital an even safer place for all those who live and work here and of course for those who come to visit.

'The Programme asks for long-term commitment from all partners and communities to develop and implement policies that will lead to attitudinal changes towards violence. This is recognised as the path to a permanent and sustainable reduction in violence.'
